


- Sharp enamel points-causing
- lacerations on cheek or tongue

 Retained caps (unshed baby teeth)
- Long or sharp canine teeth interfering with bit
- Lost broken teeth
- Uneven bite planes
- Worn teeth
- Abnormally long teeth
- Infected teeth and gums
- Misalignment
- Periodontal disease
